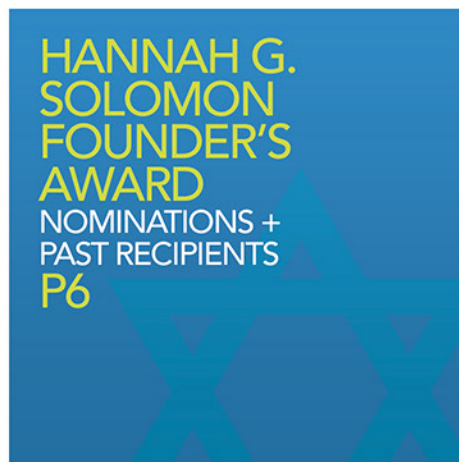

2017 WILL BE A YEAR OF ACTION & ADVOCACY

With new administrations soon taking office in Washington, D.C. and Jefferson City, MO. – we face new challenges. We are committed to working even harder on issues that will improve the lives of women, children and families—issues like voter rights, civil rights, access to women's health care, funding for social services, and more. We need our member's support now more than ever. Let us know if you are interested in getting involved. 2017 WILL BE A YEAR OF GROWTH

Our *Kids Community Closet* project is continuing to expand, both in the number of schools we are serving and in the types of items we are providing for the children. Thanks to a very generous grant from the Siteman Family Foundation, we are going to be able to provide additional needed items to the children – such as belts, sweatshirts, personal care supplies, and more. Since October we added 3 new closets. We now have 19 closets, serving 23 schools, in 7 school districts. With a waiting list of schools that need our services, we anticipate opening 1-2 additional closets in the months ahead.

Healing Hearts Bank, the micro lending program we began 5 years ago, now has 5 branches and currently serves 15 agencies. Another branch is slated to open in early 2017. We know that credit building is the number one reason borrowers cite for their loans.

In 2016 Hillary Zimmerman Hebel joined the Hannah G. Solomon Society by donating \$1,000 towards the Annual Campaign after being an NCJW-St. Louis member since 1980. I was curious to find out why now and had a delightful interview with Hillary getting the answer.

Hillary's story is like so many of us. She moved to St. Louis in 1977 after completing law school in Washington DC. As a working professional, she could not attend any organization meetings during the day. NCJW-St. Louis had formed an evening group that was comprised of either working women or young mothers and that group filled both Hillary's volunteer and social needs at the time as the women formed her core group of friends. She appreciated the caliber of women engaged in NCJW and found their liberal, progressive and savvy views very compatible with her own. The older generation became mentors.

Over the years, Hillary's time has been consumed with family and her very rewarding 30 year legal career with McCormack Baron. Her involvement with NCJW has focused on the Advisory Council chaired by Hillary Friedman. An active member for the past six years, she values the collective skills and community wisdom that the Advisory Council members bring to the table as they help solve issues for NCJW-St. Louis or offer their expertise in helping to shape our vision.

Hillary is selective in how she shares her philanthropic dollars. Her decision to become a Hannah G. Solomon Society member was centered on her respect for the organization, her admiration for Ellen Alper's leadership and the way in which NCJW-St. Louis not only thinks futuristically, but the professional manner in which projects are planned and executed. She sees so much need in our broader community and admires the manner in which we partner and take action. She specifically referred to the expanding Healing Hearts Bank project. ELECTION RECAP

In the aftermath of the recent elections, many members have reached out to NCJW for ideas on how to become more involved in advocating for issues that impact women, children and families. We are actively working to expand our advocacy opportunities and involve more of our members and potential new members. Here are some highlights:

- Creating “every-day advocates” by educating members on key issues through our Lunch and Learn series, evening Cocktails & Causes sessions, film group, etc.
- Better integrating advocacy with our service work – our own projects like Back to School! Store and Healing Hearts Bank and the work of our coalition agencies like PROMO, Planned Parenthood and labor unions.
- Providing training in various advocacy tactics, including social media, writing letters to the editor and opinion pieces and contacting elected representatives by phone/email.
- Developing a team of advocates focused around each of our primary issues to guarantee a strong NCJW presence to ensure consideration in the legislature.
- Working with younger women’s groups to integrate our deep advocacy experience with their energy and commitment.
- Seeking opportunities to build connections across religious, racial, economic and geographical divisions, because we believe we are better together.

JANUARY IS HUMAN TRAFFICKING AWARENESS MONTH

NCJW-St. Louis has identified the following as laws which are needed to help trafficking victims in Missouri:

- The prohibiting of destruction, concealment, removal, or possession of any passport, immigration, or other government document by an employer.
- Requirement for national hotline postings by businesses which traffickers and their victims frequent.
- Better define Safe Harbor laws in order to ensure that minors are treated appropriately. The expansion of Safe Harbor laws would ensure that victims were not charged with crimes that were a result of being trafficked.
- Vacate convictions for trafficking and trafficking related offenses for survivors and allow survivors who were forced into crimes to have convictions cleared from their records, avoiding the lifelong burden of having a criminal record.

LARC has been proven to dramatically reduce unintended pregnancies and abortions. NCJW is embarking upon a new initiative to help educate women about this method, including advocating for better insurance coverage and price subsidies.



3/16 Post-Incarceration Support Programs

Former State Senator Jeff Smith spent time in prison for violating federal election laws during his 2004 campaign for Congress. Smith now works with Concordance Academy, helping inmates overcome barriers of prejudice and punitive public policies.

NCJW'S KIDS COMMUNITY CLOSET PROGRAM

This is the time of year when kids switch to cold weather gear, so that means the KCC volunteers (liaisons) have been busy delivering hats, gloves, coats and long-sleeved shirts to all of our closets.

With the opening of Jefferson and Monroe in St. Louis Public and Pershing in University City this fall, we now serve students in 23 elementary schools! We have also expanded some of our offerings to include belts, sanitary and other personal hygiene products. We get requests in from schools to open closets all the time. There is a tremendous need in our community to help students with the basics so they can come to school and learn every day.

5 branches currently serve **15** agencies. Another branch is slated to open in early 2017.

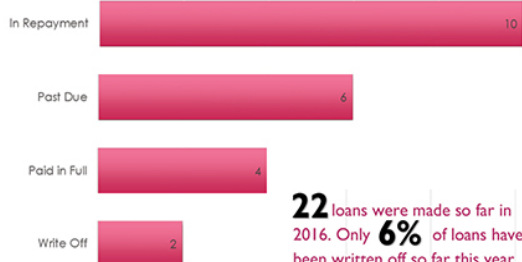


65 loans made over the life of the program.
