Tomorrow, the Supreme Court will hear *Biden vs. Texas,* which will decide whether the Biden Administration must retain a federal immigration program based on the capacity of the Department of Homeland Security and how bound is one

administration to policies from a previous administration under the Administrative Procedure Act (APA).

In 2018, the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS) created the Migrant Protection Protocols (MPP) – sometimes known as the "Remain in Mexico Policies." DHS decided to terminate the MPP on June 1, 2021. Texas and Missouri sued, arguing that

the decision to end the program violated federal immigration law and the Administrative Procedure Act (APA). A district court and the 5th Circuit ruled in favor of the states.

This decision will impact the authority of presidents to change policies from previous administrations, including presidential discretion on immigration policy. More importantly, it will impact those whose lives are in limbo at the border.
