<u>Missourians for Healthy Families and Fair Wages</u>, a coalition of which NCJWSTL is a member, has launched a ballot initiative to gradually raise Missouri's minimum wage to \$15 by 2026 and allow employees to earn paid time off to care for themselves and loved ones.

Missourians for Health Families and Fair Wages rewards hardworking Missourians by making sure they can care for their families and keep food on the table. By gradually increasing the minimum wage, we can ensure wages can keep up with rising prices. By ensuring that all workers have the ability to earn paid sick leave, we can make sure no parent has to choose between taking care of themselves or loved ones and affording the cost of necessities like medicine or utilities.

Urge Governor Parson to Veto SB 35



In 2022, there were 92,497 domestic relations cases filed in Missouri. A carve out for child custody cases where a parent has a history of domestic violence is essential. If <u>SB 35</u> is signed now and the legislature implements it in the 2024 session, **almost 100,000 Missouri children could have to spend 50% of their life with someone who has a history of**

abuse.

Having children in common is often a barrier for victims wanting to leave an abuser. They often look to the courts to safely separate from an abusive partner. And, if passed, this bill would limit judges' discretion in deciding the best plan for children. We have a responsibility to protect the most vulnerable in Missouri.

Urge Congress to Pass The Judicial Ethics and Anti-Corruption Act

The Judicial Ethics and Anti-Corruption Act,

recently re-introduced by Representative Pramila Jayapal (D-WA) and Senator Elizabeth Warren (D-MA), would modernize our nation's judicial ethics laws and restore public trust in our federal court system. This legislation includes an overhaul of the judicial recusal process, the establishment of a Supreme Court code of conduct and a ban on federal judges owning individual stocks. These reforms would ensure that judges and



justices are held to the highest ethical standards and are free from conflicts of interest.

On average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner in the United States. During one year, this equates to more than 10 million individuals. It can happen to anyone regardless of race, gender, sexual orientation, age and socioeconomic background.

Get FREE Emergency Contraception at NCJWSTL!

NCJWSTL is thrilled to announce that we have partnered with the <u>Missouri Family Health Council</u> (MFHC) to distribute **FREE emergency contraception kits**! This effort is vitally important in the wake of last year's Supreme Court decision overturning Roe vs. Wade, especially in states like Missouri where abortion is illegal. Everyone should have the right to determine when and if they wish to start a family, and emergency contraception is vital in preventing unwanted pregnancies.



Also known as the morning-after pill, or by the brand

name Plan B, the emergency contraception pill is an over-the-counter form of birth control that can be taken up to five days after unprotected sex to avoid pregnancy. The goal of this effort is to reduce geographic and financial barriers Missourians face in accessing emergency contraception pills.

While supplies last, MFHC, NCJWSTL and other partner organizations are offering free EC kits to anyone of any age. Feel free to stop by the NCJWSTL office to pick up your kit - for you or a loved one.
